While we have your attention, when you attend for your scheduled training attendance, it is recommended you wear comfortable clothes and footwear, as you will be undertaking practical exercises on the floor.

Course Information

This unit of competency is delivered and assessed through your attendance and participation at a 3.5 hr training program.

Purpose of the course

The purpose of the training course is to provide participants with the skills and knowledge to perform CPR. It is recommended that this unit of competency be undertaken every 12 months to ensure competency in performing CPR.

It is important to be aware that First Aid guidelines recommend upgrading this qualification every three years.

Elements and Performance Criteria

ELEMENT

PERFORMANCE CRITERIA

Elements define the essential outcomes.

Performance criteria specify the level of performance needed to demonstrate achievement of the element.

1. Respond to an emergency situation

- 1.1 Recognise an emergency situation
- 1.2 Identify, assess and minimise immediate hazards to health and safety of self and others
- 1.3 Assess the casualty and recognise the need for CPR
- 1.4 Seek assistance from emergency response services

2. Perform CPR procedures

- 2.1 Perform cardiopulmonary resuscitation in accordance with ARC guidelines
- 2.2 Display respectful behaviour towards casualty
- 2.3 Operate automated external defibrillator (AED) according to manufacturer's instructions

3. Communicate details of the incident

- 3.1 Accurately convey incident details to emergency response services
- 3.2 Report details of incident to workplace supervisor as appropriate
- 3.3 Maintain confidentiality of records and information in line with statutory and/or organisational policies

REQUIRED SKILLS AND KNOWLEDGE

Performance Evidence

The candidate must show evidence of the ability to complete tasks outlined in elements and performance criteria of this unit, manage tasks and manage contingencies in the context of the job role.

There must be evidence that the candidate has completed the following tasks in line with state/territory regulations, first aid codes of practice, Australian Resuscitation Council (ARC) guidelines and workplace procedures:

Followed DRSABCD in line with ARC guidelines, including:

performed at least 2 minutes of uninterrupted single rescuer cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) (5 cycles of both compressions and ventilations) on an adult resuscitation manikin placed on the floor

performed at least 2 minutes of uninterrupted single rescuer CPR (5 cycles both compressions and ventilations) on an infant resuscitation manikin placed on a firm surface

responded appropriately in the event of regurgitation or vomiting

managed the unconscious breathing casualty

followed single rescue procedure, including the demonstration of a rotation of operators with minimal interruptions to compressions

followed the prompts of an automated external defibrillator (AED)

Responded to at least one simulated first aid scenario contextualised to the candidate's workplace/community setting, including:

demonstrated safe manual handling techniques

provided an accurate verbal or written report of the incident

Knowledge Evidence

The candidate must be able to demonstrate essential knowledge required to effectively complete tasks outlined in elements and performance criteria of this unit, manage tasks and manage contingencies in the context of the work role. This includes knowledge of:

State/Territory regulations, first aid codes of practice and workplace procedures including:

- ARC Guidelines relevant to the provision of CPR
- safe work practices to minimise risks and potential hazards
- infection control principles and procedures, including use of standard precautions
- requirements for currency of skill and knowledge

REQUIRED SKILLS AND KNOWLEDGE

- awareness of potential need for stress-management techniques and available support following an emergency situation
- duty of care requirements
- respectful behaviour towards a casualty
- own skills and limitations
- consent
- privacy and confidentiality requirements
- importance of debriefing

Considerations when providing CPR, including:

- airway obstruction due to body position
- appropriate duration and cessation of CPR
- appropriate use of an AED
- chain of survival
- standard precautions

Basic anatomy and physiology relating to:

- how to recognise a person is not breathing normally
- chest
- response/consciousness
- upper airway and effect of positional change

Training Delivery

Attendance

Participants will be required to attend the full 3.5 hour session & undertake assessment activities to be deemed competent in this unit.

Delivery Mode and Strategy

Presentation of information within the national competency standards for the identified competency, by an appropriately qualified trainer utilising a range of learning strategies including:

- Practical tasks
- Group discussion
- Activities

Assessment

Assessment Process

The assessment process provides you with an opportunity to demonstrate competency through:

- Written work – in class questions
- Oral questions
- Demonstration of skills and knowledge

Overview of Assessment Tasks for HLTAID001 Provide CPR

Uniting RTO will gather evidence of competency by asking you to complete 5 assessment tasks, 4 of these are in class demonstrations of skill and one is a short written test conducted in class. If you have any questions or concerns about any of the assessments, we encourage you to talk to your Trainer/Assessor.

These tasks have been designed to provide you with the opportunity to demonstrate your competency in relation to HLTAID001 Provide CPR, however if you are unable to demonstrate your skills and knowledge, a reassessment will be needed.

Assessment Tasks are all completed within the training session and will be undertaken after you have been provided with demonstrations, discussions

and the opportunity to practice the skills. The following assessments will be undertaken:

Assessment task 1a: Perform CPR (Observation)

- In this task you will demonstrate performing CPR for 2 minutes on an adult manikin

Assessment task 1b: Perform CPR (Observation)

- In this task you will demonstrate performing CPR for 2 minutes on an infant manikin

Assessment task 2: Perform CPR & use an AED (Observation) including transition from single operator to two operators CPR

- In this task you will demonstrate performing CPR on a manikin, attaching and AED and following the prompts of the AED & transitioning from a single operator to working with two people providing CPR in turn.

Assessment task 3: In class written assessment

- In this task you will be required to respond to a series of multiple choice questions that provide evidence of your knowledge. The pass rate is 80%.

Assessment task 4: Workplace Scenario this assessment requires you to undertake an assessment of a casualty and respond according to the presentation and CPR guidelines (Observation)

Assessment Processes

Assessment Submission

All assessments are completed during class time. In this instance participants will be required to submit assessment tasks/be prepared to demonstrate their skills to their trainer/assessor. Participants must comply with the requirements of completing assessments and the submission in order to receive a result on each assessment task.

Assessment Feedback

You will be provided with verbal feedback as you progress through the course.

At the end of the course your assessor will look at all the assessment tasks in your evidence portfolio and provide you feedback. This feedback will tell you if you have provided sufficient information to demonstrate competency.

If at this stage there is insufficient evidence to warrant a result of competency achieved (CA) you will be given the opportunity to resubmit work or given an additional assessment task.

Resubmitted Work/Additional Assessment Task

If any submitted assessment task is assessed as not meeting the criteria for competency the participant will be:

- Provided with feedback from the educator/trainer/assessor
- Given ONE opportunity to provide additional evidence or resubmit work or given an additional assessment task.
- The assessor will add this new information to your evidence portfolio before making a final assessment and issuing a Statement of Attainment
- If after the resubmission the assessable task(s) does not demonstrate competency, a final result of "Not Yet Competent" will be recorded for that assessment task.

Issuing Statements of Attainment and Qualifications

Students will be advised of their course result by email within a week of the course.

Upon satisfactory completion of course requirements and assessments, participants will be issued with a Statement of Attainment within 4 – 6 weeks of completing the course.

Statement of Attainment is defined as follows:

"A statement of attainment recognises that one or more accredited units has been achieved." AQF Framework, 2013
